BE THE CHANGE

Books all have to start somewhere, and that place is typically in the depths of a writer's mind. But where do writers come from?

The first time I met an author - an actual person who had written and published books - was in 3rd grade when Eric Carle (of The Very Hungry Caterpillar fame) visited my elementary school. Our class had to make our own picture books as part of our studies leading up to his visit. I wrote about climbing trees. Like most adults looking at children's work, he told me it was very good and to keep writing - so I have.

Fast forward a few decades and today's students have access to generative AI programs that can do the work for them. Not only is this not making them practice what they've been learning in school, but it can affect creativity. If one can create a story or piece of art by typing a prompt (a description of what content to include in the creation) into an Al program and clicking a button, they skip the entire creative process.



Beyond the topic of academic honesty, it is hardly a stretch to imagine that one day soon, we will see books created using this AI technology. Authors who have to craft every sentence, every paragraph of their work, could find themselves unable to keep up with unrealistic deadlines set by publishers who expect them to be faster than a machine. To put it frankly, the creativity and culture that we, as humans, have created for millennia, will suffer the effects of technology.

So, how can we curb this and make sure that society is raising writers, as well as readers? Encourage children to write! It could be journaling, short stories, poetry, or even fiction based on their favorite characters. Help them love writing as much as they love reading and support their creative endeavours when they share them.

The Friends of the Largo Library are currently presenting the **40th Annual Iris & Stanley Shalit Short Story Competition!** The competition is open to all Pinellas County students in grades 4 -12. This year's prompt is "The Five Senses," and submissions are due on Saturday, March 30th by 5:00 PM EST. 
swapping within your community vs shopping for new items whenever possible. These events help to reduce waste by keeping goods out of landfills, increase access to resources, and strengthen community values.

One of the many great programs offered in the Children's Department at the Largo Public Library is Pup Pals Reading Dogs.

The Pup Pals Reading Program gives children between the ages of 5 and 12 the opportunity to read out aloud to trained therapy dogs to help improve their reading skills and help them

They chose to purchase a commemorative brick arrangement offered through the Greater Largo Library Foundation to remember Conrad. The commemorative bricks to honor Conrad will be placed around the planter box at the entrance to the library.
